

- William Foxton Hayley 1878
 Doctor in Goulburn from 1868
 Freemason, Justice of Peace 1878 [13 E]

 - Particularly concerned for the health of women; on hearing of his death a woman was heard to cry 'God help the women of Goulburn'
 - Staff Surgeon of the Western Battalion of Volunteer rifles
 Medical officer of the Oddfellow's Lodge

 - Over 2000 people at his funeral; 3 bands and 70 carriages
- 2. William Davis 1876 [13 E]

 Member of Masonic Lodge

 - Lived at Woodhouselee
 - Daughter married William Hayley Foxton
- John Fuller 1840 [13 R]
- A convict who was murdered
 Controversy surrounds the identity of the murderer a man was tried, found guilty and sent to Norfolk Island (some reports say
 - hanged)
 However a bushranger named Paddy Curran later confessed to the murder shortly before being hung at Berrima Gaol for another crime
- 4. David Walters
- 1889
 - Run over by the Mail Train near North Goulburn
 - Horse breaker and general dealer
- 5. George Brabham
- 1875 [22 Q]
- Died from gunshot accident Shot in the hand while shepherding
- 6. William Sidwell
 - Sidwell 1872 [29 Q] Convict who received Ticket of Leave in 1841
 - Convict who received Ticket of Leave in 1972
 Built Governor's Arms Hotel, c1860 Governor's Hill, Goulburn, later named Riggsdale

- 7. William Conolly 1887 [31 N]

 Justice of the Peace

 Bought Sinclair's Flour Mill, Sloane St between Clinton St and Glebe Ave
 - Later moved to cnr Sloane & Blackshaw Rd
- Francis Elphinstone Gouldesbury 1860 [31 L]
 Justice of the Peace
 Sub Gold Commissioner for Tuena

 - Formerly in the Indian Army
- 9. Samuel Watling 1868 [27 E]

 Died in an accident at Towrang aged 49

 Newspaper reports death in 1867, crushed by
 - an overturned cart William **Brown**
 - Drowned in the flooded Mulwaree River aged 49.
- 10. Aubrey **Sherring** 1915 [21 E]
 Before enlisting he was a schoolteacher in
 - Goulburn and later at Waratah Public School
 - Killed at Gallipoli
- 11. John Blackshaw 1873 [18 F]

 - Manager of Bradley's Brewery
 Owned Blackshaw's Well (Blackshaw Road, East Goulburn), early water supplier to
 - Owned his own brewery Foston at Eastgrove
- 12. Henry Blackshaw
- Major in the Goulburn Volunteer Infantry
- 13. William Maule
 - Police constable
 - Killed by a fall from his horse on the way to Mummel while on duty
- 14. Reginald Compton 1915
 - Born in Train Street, Goulburn (later renamed Sloane St, between Glebe Ave and Mundy Street)
 - Killed at Gallipoli
